Despite geopolitical tensions, India anticipates a surge of over 10% in inbound tourism this year, fuelled by conflicts in the Middle East and a post-pandemic shift in tourists from China. Recent data shows a remarkable 305.4% growth in foreign tourist arrivals (FTAs) in 2023, reaching 9.23 million visitors. While still shy of the pre-pandemic level of 10.93 million in 2019, experts foresee crossing this milestone in 2024.

Jenrick urges parliamentary 'lock' on migration

Robert Jenrick has proposed that the UK gov-ernment should establish a parliamentary "lock" to cap the number of migrants entering Britain, aiming to reduce net migration to tens of thou-

In his report, "Taking Back Control," the former

immigration minister suggests setting a "migration budget" to limit overall migration levels and the number through visa routes, with these caps being set and approved by parliament.

The report recommends that a cabinet minister should annually update Parliament on the impact of migration on housing, infrastructure, and public services, including the NHS. It also calls for a tougher points-based visa system, labelling the UK as the "grammar school of the Western world," to ensure visas are predominantly granted to highly



well-paid

Following recent government actions to tighten foreign student visas and raise visa salarv thresholds by over 50%, Jenrick's report suggests these thresholds should increase even further. Moreover, the report

urges Prime Minister Rishi Sunak to reinstate the Conservative commitment, initially made by David Cameron in 2010, to reduce net migration to below 100,000—a target not achieved during Cameron's tenure and later abandoned by Boris Johnson. Despite a slight decrease from 2022, last year's net migration to the UK was 672,000, significantly

higher than pre-pandemic figures.

This 100-page report, coauthored by Neil O'Brien, a former levelling up and health minister, was produced for the Centre for Policy Studies think tank
